Uptick in malware disguised as ChatGPT-related software. “Since March alone, our security analysts have found around 10 malware families posing as ChatGPT and similar tools to compromise accounts across the internet,” Meta said in a report. Meta says (Opens in a new window) the goal behind the ChatGPT-themed malware is “to run unauthorized ads from compromised business accounts across the internet.” One of the identified malware strains, dubbed NodeStealer, can also steal passwords from a victim's computer by looting the cookies and login information on the browser.

John was on sick leave so I tried to fill the shoes. but not that well.

My note taking and memory is much worse than John's so here is the best I can recall.

Browsers and search engines?

The question was posed as to what is the difference between a browser and search engine.

First up I went simple and basic.

The Browser is no more than a vehicle to get us to the internet, and in simple you access by entering a known address into the address line. To find a site you did not know the address of you needed to enter a criteria. Early days this was a Boolean value that was a structured statement. The clearer the statement the more likely you got the result you were after.

The World moved on and now we have Search Engines that add to the process of finding 'stuff' on the web.

The two work together to give us access to the web and to find sites and data.

Simple

Browser + Search engine = access to the web and its numerous web sites.

Browsers are Edge from Microsoft, Safari from Apple, Chrome from Google, Firefox from Mozilla, and many more.

Search engines were developed becoming a huge data bases of data links, and programming to search and access that base for the answer to our queries.

Everyone knows Google and it probably lead the way, but by no means was it the only one. But it is the biggest, and possibly the best. There are some search engines that are specifically targeted at a selective set of data and only accessibly by accreditation. Medical is an example.

The world has further moved on with most Browsers now including propriety search engines, i.e. Chrome has Google; Edge has Bing, Samsung has its own search engine as does Apple.

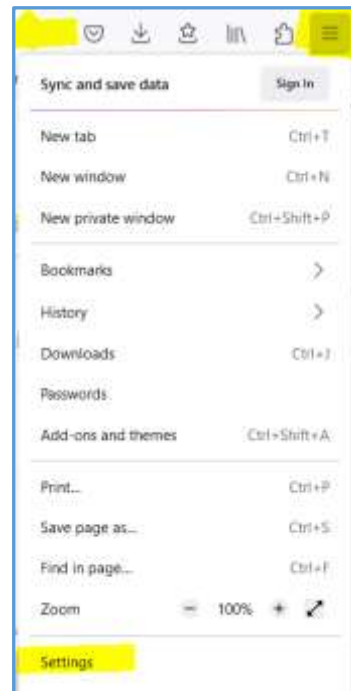
All (I think I can say this) browsers have setting where you can make any engine you prefer the default for the Browser.

I believe everyone when loading any programme needs to access it settings and check how you can customise it to meet your security and privacy requirements.

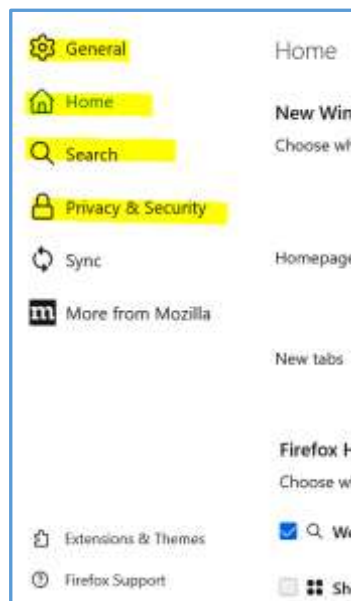
With Browsers this is usually easy to do using the Ellipse (three dots) or the stack of minus signs (a hamburger) you will find on the top bar on the left side.

Of particular use is the privacy and security one.

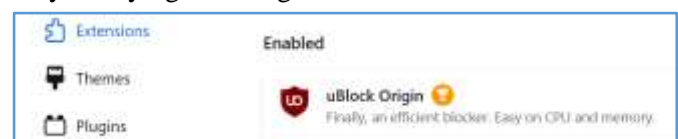
The other options will allow you to customise as you wish and maybe set your default search engine.
