### Forced Password change

Pasted the word into a Libre Office document and increased the font size.

The capital "I" was actually "!" (an exclamation mark), no wonder it did not work.

### Photos on Android phone, where stored?

The photos are stored in the Pictures folder within the DCIM "Digital Camera Images" folder.

DCIM/Pictures

The DCIM folder is in the Internal or Main storage area.

An added SD card may be described as External storage or SD card or by the card name (e.g.) SanDisk SD card.

Using a File Manager the images can be moved to the SD Card, if fitted.

Should the phone fail, the card can be removed and you still have your pictures.

Remember, prudence suggests that backup is desirable.

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### So Long LastPass – Hello NordPass

For several years, I used LastPass as my password manager. The free version allowed my PC and Android devices to use the same encrypted vault. In 2021 there was a change. Only paid accounts could have PC and Android using a shared vault. The free version no longer did. This required one vault for the PC and another for Android devices.

Because of this, a few UCHUG members changed to the free open-source BitWarden for their multi-platform password management, which uses the same vault across all platforms. I tried BitWarden and did not care for the interface. LastPass either auto-filled or only required a single mouse click to fill in the login information. BitWarden usually needed two or three clicks. But it may have just been me or an incorrect setting. At any rate, I didn't want to change. So, I created an account for my Android devices and exported the PC vault. I also had different master passwords for each version. It required me to sink the two different vaults manually, but I was willing to accept this inconvenience for free.

Then, last year one of the LastPass backup servers was breached, and some user information was stolen. LastPass Corporate informed their users and assured everyone that sensitive data (usernames, passwords, credit card information, etc.) was encrypted and safe. This prompted me to re-evaluate password managers. After online reviews of password managers, I decided to give NordPass a try.

My reasons to try were:

1. They are highly rated in many password manager reviews.
2. They recently had and passed an independent security audit.
3. They have never been breached. LastPass has. In 2022, LastPass suffered significant security incidents. User data, billing information, and vaults (with some fields encrypted and others not) were breached, leading many security professionals to call for users to change all their passwords and switch to other password managers.
4. NordPass is based in Panama, which has no mandatory data retention laws and does not participate in the Five Eyes or Fourteen Eyes alliances. This means

that the company isn't required by law to keep logs or share them with governments.

5. Your NordPass vault is encrypted with the XChaCha20 encryption algorithm. XChaCha20 is more modern and faster than AES 256-bit. For an explanation, go to XChaCha20 Encryption vs. AES-256: What's the Difference? | NordPass

6. They have a family plan that allows up to 6 independent accounts. You can also share your vault with a family member. For example, this will allow me and my wife to have a synced vault.

7. The software is multi-platform. Even the free version can be used on all my devices using the same vault. After loading the NordPass free version, it asked for some account setup info: username, password, and Master Password. You should make it different from your account password, as it will be the magic key to decrypting your vault. I used a phrase that would be easy to remember containing the normal mix of upper/lower case, symbols, and numbers. You will use this key on all your devices to decrypt the vault. **DO NOT FORGET WHAT THE MASTER PASSWORD IS!** You are the only one that knows what it is. NordPass support cannot help if you forget it. There is one thing that may help. When you create your master password, you will receive a 24-character alphanumeric recovery code. The recovery code will allow you to create a new master password. You should lock this code away in a safe place. During the Windows setup process, you will be prompted to install the browser extension for whatever browsers you have installed. Setup will help you get and install the extension as needed.

After the setup, I exported my password vault from LastPass and imported it into NordPass. Everything went in without a hitch. Next, I went into settings, turned off launching at startup, and set the auto-lock to four hours. That way NordPass will only launch if I needed it, as there are times I am not doing anything that would require a login. Also, the four-hour timeout will keep NordPass from requiring a re-login unless I go over four hours or shut down.

I set the password generator for upper/lower case numbers and symbols. I also set it for 16 characters. Next was to install NordPass on my Android phone and tablet (both Samsung). The app is available in the play store and can be installed easily. The app also installs into your browsers, so there isn't a separate extension installation that I had on the Windows PC. You can launch the NordPass app on Android devices, but I find that just going to a site requiring a login will bring up NordPass as a selection for a spelling selection atop the onscreen keyboard. You select NordPass, which will open the window to input the Master Password. Then you can populate the login info for the site you are accessing.

On my phone, I left auto lock at five minutes as a trial time. If I go to another location requiring login info within five minutes, I do not need to input the Master Password again. Better to be more careful with the phone auto lock settings than the PC on my desk at home. After using NordPass for a few days, I liked how it worked. Since I wanted to have NordPass available to my wife and share the vault with her, I opted for the family plan. The cost for the two-year plan is \$68.00. But with six separate accounts available, I can offer an account to both my wife and my son. Also, the paid plan offers a weak and reused password check and a data breach scanner to scan the web for data breaches. I spent some time doing some cleanup. When checking for weak passwords, a change password button will launch a browser to the site needing a password change. Unless you want to create a new password, NordPass will manually offer to autofill the new password per your password settings and save it to the vault.

I am happy and comfortable with NordPass. However, if you have never used a password manager or are looking for an alternative to one you may be using, go to <https://nordpass.com/> and check the personal free version.

## **Tech Travels Times Two.**

2022 was a disaster of a year for me. Most of my vacation time from work was used up in random days taken to solve one life problem or another. (Greg's dad had recently died, and his mom needed to go into an assisted living facility.) The only bright spot for me was an invitation from my son to join him on a four-day trip to the Great American Beer Fest (GABF) in Denver during the first week of October.

It looked like my wife, and I would not get any trip to celebrate our October anniversary until some other friends invited us to join them at a resort in Newport Beach they had booked for a week. So, we were able to get away for two nights, which was more in the end than we were expecting we could do.

These two recent trips allowed me to put my troubles aside for a time and also allowed me to see technology in new and different ways. Of course, we use a lot of tech in our daily lives, but it sometimes requires a change in the situation to see how it affects and enhances our experiences. Travel can help bring that out.

My trip with my son to the GABF in Colorado was an adventure in tech experiences. In addition to the

usual travel tech I've dealt with in the past, I stayed at an Airbnb and rode a Lime e-bike and scooter, all for the first time.

This was also my first trip with my new smartphone, a Samsung Galaxy S22. It was travel that caused me to replace my five-year-old Samsung J3 with this new phone, as my old phone (and its old Android version) could no longer run the Southwest Airlines app. In addition to being more powerful and thus able to run Google Maps and other apps much faster, the phone's new OS version has some neat new features that are handy for travel. One is the ability to turn on the phone in camera mode quickly. My phone is set up to require a password, which can cause a delay when a quick photo opportunity presents itself. I found a rapid double press of the power button bypasses the password and opens the camera app, so you are ready to shoot. I guess it is OK if someone steals my phone and can take photos; they won't be able to get into it to see them, however.

On our Southwest flight from San Diego to Denver, my son and I used our phones to watch movies. I also used the flight tracking display. I used my hands-free corded earbuds, but since my new phone does not have a headphone jack, I used the USB-C headphone adapter I brought.

Though we were staying a 15-minute walk from the downtown convention center where the GABF was held, my son rented a car so we could get to and from the airport and get around on the other non-fest days.

He reserved an economy car, but all they had to give us was a Dodge Caravan minivan loaded with electronic features. My son drove, and I navigated, and when I connected my phone to the minivan's USB, it showed the phone's Google Maps display on the vehicle's dash screen using Google Auto. I may have been doing something wrong, however, as each time I disconnected the phone from the car, the phone would not run Google Maps again until I rebooted the phone.

My son doesn't like hotels and prefers Airbnbs, so he booked one for our three-night stay. It was interesting as I'd never stayed in one. When we arrived, my son communicated with the owner through texts and got the combination of the electronic door lock. It was a small house in an older near-downtown neighborhood that was becoming gentrified.

It was comfortable enough, with a small bedroom and a loft, a single bath, and a kitchen where we made breakfast each morning (he cooked, and I cleaned up). The owner provided good password-protected internet access through Wi-Fi. I brought my laptop on the trip and always used my VPN when connecting.

One issue I saw with our Airbnb lodging was ADA access, something I have become more aware of from dealing with my mom. There was no way to get in without going up steps, and the bathroom had a freestanding, high-walled tub shower that even I was a little concerned about safely stepping in and out of. There must be a way to search for accessible accommodations on the Airbnb site, something my son was not concerned with. I do know the chain hotels I usually stay in that my son shuns would all meet at least basic accessibility standards.

The GABF is held in evening sessions; we had tickets for Thursday night, leaving our days free. In addition to myself and my son, some of my son's friends were also attending; they were staying in downtown hotels. We toured the Colorado State capital building on the day of the fest, a free and very good tour. We tried to get tickets to tour the Denver Mint, but the Department of the Treasury requires the free tickets be requested through an email attachment. My son's phone could not open their web pdf application, but mine could, so I filled out the form and was able to email it. Unfortunately, we never got a response, most likely because we requested the tour on short notice that afternoon.

The day after the fest, we decided to try out the Lime e-bikes we saw all around downtown. A very nice, isolated bike/walking path along Cherry Creek in Denver was within easy walking distance. Since Uber sold its e-bike business to Lime and is a major investor, you can use the Uber app (which my son and I already had) to ride Lime bikes. In the app, you first search for bikes nearby. We looked in the neighborhoods around our Airbnb and found some about 10 minutes away. Once you have found bikes, it is important to verify that they are charged.

They have a circular display with six pie pieces, indicating the charge level. The bikes we found had five pieces, enough for our adventure. To use, the app prompts you to read the QR code on the bike; you can then accept the rate and ride. We must have

gotten an introductory rate, as it was only \$0.50 to unlock and \$0.02 per minute. We found later that the normal rate in Denver is \$0.32 per minute.

The bikes are pedal assist, meaning you must crank the pedals to go. If you pedal less, it assists more; pedaling harder uses less assist (and less battery power). The bikes appear to have regenerative braking, charging the battery when decelerating (hand brakes stop the bike). The bikes are heavier than my street bike, but riding was still fun. Next, we rode to a brewery for lunch; the Lime bike ride only cost me \$2.38.

We then walked back downtown, passing through some nice old neighborhoods with parks. Deciding we were too far away to walk back, we looked for more bikes but could only find Lime scooters. So we decided to try those and rode them back to our Airbnb. The scooters rent the same as the bikes, with the same battery display. They have hand brakes and a throttle lever on the right handlebar. To go, kick off with one foot and press the throttle. They feel less safe than a bike, especially in traffic, but we only went a short distance. I'd probably ride Lime e-bikes again; I'm not sure about the scooters.

The week after returning from Denver, my wife and I drove to Newport Beach to stay with friends at a timeshare resort run by a well-known high-end chain. We only stayed two nights but had a more relaxing trip than the Denver one. I again brought my laptop to stay in touch through email, but I was surprised that this resort had completely open guest Wi-Fi. So I again made sure I used my VPN and avoided sensitive online activities.

I was glad I could finally get away from home and my problems, have some fun tech adventures and get a little rest. But, unfortunately, it made me realize I would rather be retired and traveling all the time. Maybe someday.

### **Kretchmar's Korner. The Russians are Coming**

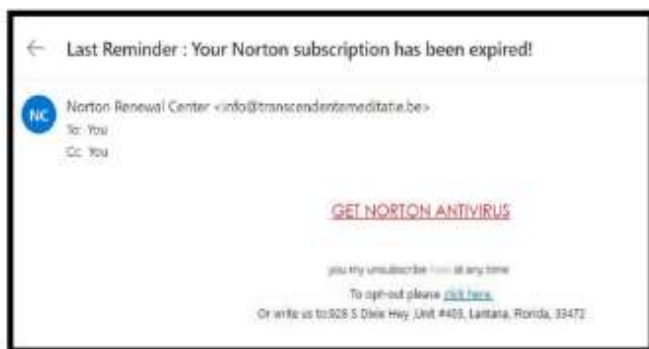
As Russia's invasion of Ukraine grinds on, it becomes increasingly likely that Russia will intensify cyberattacks on perceived enemies, especially the United States. As a result, at least one major federal agency is no longer allowing employees to use any USB devices on their government computers. The ability to read/write



optical media, CDs, and DVDs, has been completely cut off.

Ironically, the federal government is addressing the least likely avenue a cyber attacker is likely to use to install malware on their systems. The threat is most likely to manifest via an email containing a link to a site that will download a virus to an unsuspecting user's computer. The U.S. government does attach a warning to each email received outside the government domain. These warnings are unnecessary on your home computer, not because the threat is not real, but because ALL of the emails you receive comes from outside of your system. And it is almost certain this is the vector hackers will try to use to infect your system. Based on experience, I can safely predict that an infected email arriving in your Inbox will appear to be either from a trusted friend or a business entity with which you might have had some business.

Here is an example; this is an email I received recently:



For at least 20 years, I have not run Norton Antivirus on any computer I have owned; this email was obviously a fake and most likely attempt to compromise my system. An obvious clue is the sending address: "info@transcendentalmediate.be." In addition to the not-very-professional sounding name, the sender is obviously based out of Belgium (.be is the internet country code top-level domain (ccTLD) for Belgium.) I happen to know that Norton is based in Mountain View, California. Another term for the activity represented by this type of email is phishing. Phishing is still the world's most common cyber threat. It is estimated three billion fraudulent emails are sent out every day in an attempt to compromise sensitive information. In 2022, according to CyberTalk.org, 30% of phishing email recipients clicked on the malicious link.

Here is another example, also from my Inbox:



This was easy for me to spot since I do not use ID.me. However, this was a more sophisticated attempt since the ID.me sending address was spoofed. I could see this was not the actual sending address by hovering my mouse cursor over the address, NOT CLICKING.

You are most likely to be fooled by an email that appears to be sent from a trusted friend, as I was several years ago. My friend's computer had been compromised, and the virus perpetuated itself by invading my friend's contact list and sending infected emails to all his contacts. Be aware that the risk you will be exposed to malware infection is higher than it has ever been before. If you have any doubts about clicking on a link in any email message, don't do it.

### **Time to Replace Your Computer? Do this first.**

To most of us, replacing our computer is a double-edged sword. There is the joy of expecting to take advantage of newer, faster hardware and software, and then there's the challenge of the unknown, new features. This is especially true now because we have been using Windows 10 for a long time and our next computer will undoubtedly have Windows 11. Windows 11 was released in October 2021. All computers from typical manufacturers like Dell, HP, ASUS, Microsoft, Toshiba, Lenovo, etc., come with Windows 11. Windows 11 does have some new features, but most Windows 10 users should feel comfortable with Windows 11 once they find out where their favorite features are. They're all there, but the path to get to them is not always clear. Before you think about how to use the new computer, there is one last thing

you should do with your old computer. And that is to ensure no personal information is on the old computer. You may be giving the computer to someone, or you may be donating the computer to a service that refurbishes computers for re-distribution, or you might take it to an e-waste facility. You don't want your private information to go to the new user. (As for donated computers, I can confidently say that all the Computer User Groups I have been associated with always wiped the hard drives before anything else was done. Hard drives are often not even useable, so they are removed and destroyed, usually with a hammer or drill.)

Just a brief technical discussion. By now, most computer users know that deleting a file does not actually remove the file from the computer, and with some basic software, the file can be read (as long as another file has not been written over it). The first byte of the file indicates whether it is deleted or not. This may have been done to make it very easy for the Operating System to delete files, so it doesn't take too much time, especially if you are trying to delete hundreds of files at a time. But this leaves the file on the drive intact, except for the fact that the first byte indicates it has been deleted. When the file is deleted, all of the data space is returned to the Operating System so it can use the space again when it needs space for a new file. Depending on what else is happening, the deleted file may be written over in the next few seconds, but it might remain intact or partially intact for a long time. Of course, if it contains personal information, that information is at risk.

In the past, it was more difficult to ensure you removed all your personal information because the functionality wasn't part of the Operating System. Instead, you had to use a separate software program developed specifically for writing useless data into all of the space originally occupied by data files. There are many of those programs available, one of which is called DBAN. But today, Windows 10 makes the job very easy because that functionality can be found in Settings' "Update and Security" section. First, choose the "Recovery" option, then "Get Started," and finally, select "Reset this PC." At that point, you will be presented with "Keep my files" and "Remove everything."

"Keep my Files" Removes apps and settings but keeps your personal files; you don't want this choice. "Remove everything" Removes all your personal files, apps, and settings, which is what you want. Choosing "Remove everything" will write zeros into all of the space used by your files. Once zeros are written into a file's data space, that file will not be able to provide any indication of the original file contents. (The only slightly possible exception may be highly specialized hardware and software probably only owned by hard drive manufacturers and executed only by some government agency.) So, for all intents and purposes, the data is gone. (Remember that only the C: drive was wiped clean of your personal data. If you have a second drive, as might be the case with a desktop with personal data, the data is still on the second drive.) As a bonus, Windows 10 will be re-installed. The computer should be operating just like it did when you originally got it, but without any of the apps you installed and, of course, without your personal information.

If, for some reason, you are not comfortable using Windows 10's "Reset this PC," there is always software like DBAN available. DBAN is short for Darik's Boot And Nuke. DBAN is Free Open-Source Data Wiping Software for Personal Use, as it says on its website, dban.org. As you can see from the website, DBAN has many features and options, probably more than the average user will need. You can also get DBAN from filehippo.com, a reasonably safe place to download software. DBAN works well, but it comes with a warning, as shown below, and a disclaimer that "the authors are not liable for any damages arising from the use of this software," which might frighten some potential users."

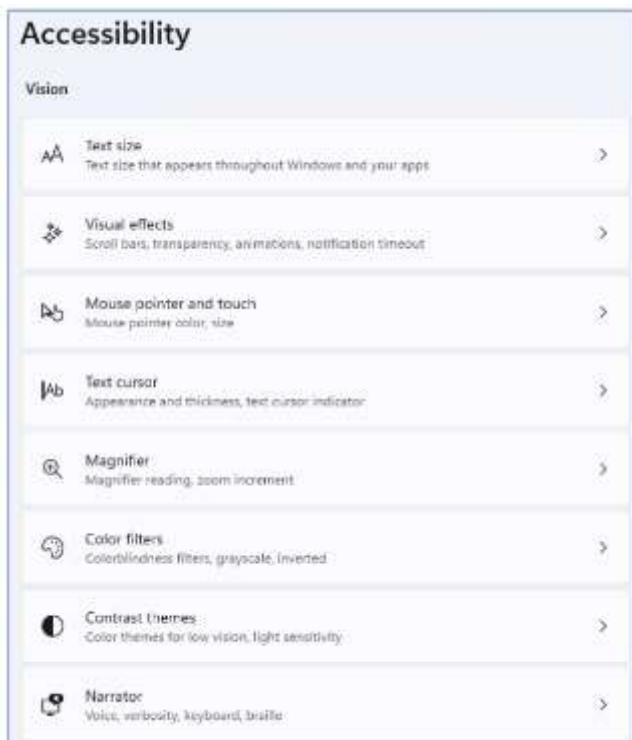
"DBAN has been designed for the home user, and although it is good at what it does, the interface is a little clunky" is a quote from the filehippo.com description, so unless you are a technically inclined user or very adventurous, this may not be for you. Use the Windows 10 "Reset this PC" functionality in that case.

## Windows 11 "Accessibility" Features Introduction

This month, we'll look into a collection of Windows 11 settings called the "Accessibility" features. These features are aimed at helping users who have various challenges, such as impaired vision or hearing or physical handicaps that make using a mouse and keyboard difficult. Much of this material also applies to Windows 10's "Ease of Access" settings.



Accessibility Settings Screen – Vision

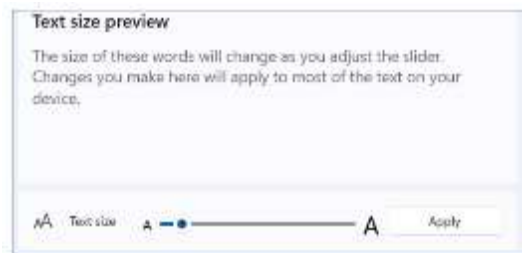
Many of the Accessibility settings are also helpful for non-challenged users, so it's worth learning more about these.

To reach the Accessibility settings, click the Windows Start icon in the Taskbar and then the

Settings (Gear) icon. Then, in the main Settings window, click Accessibility.

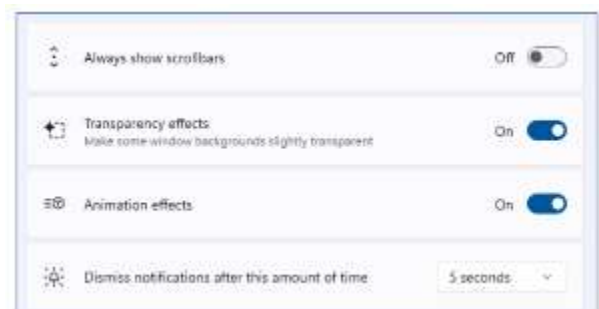
The Accessibility settings are divided into three main categories: Vision, Hearing, and Interaction. The screenshot above shows the Vision settings.

The "Text Size" setting can be useful when working on a high-resolution screen with small font sizes (8 or 10 points). You can use the slider to scale up the fonts displayed on the screen to make them more readable. For example, I've scaled up text sizes by 10% in the screenshot below. The range on the slider is 100% (no scaling) to 225%.



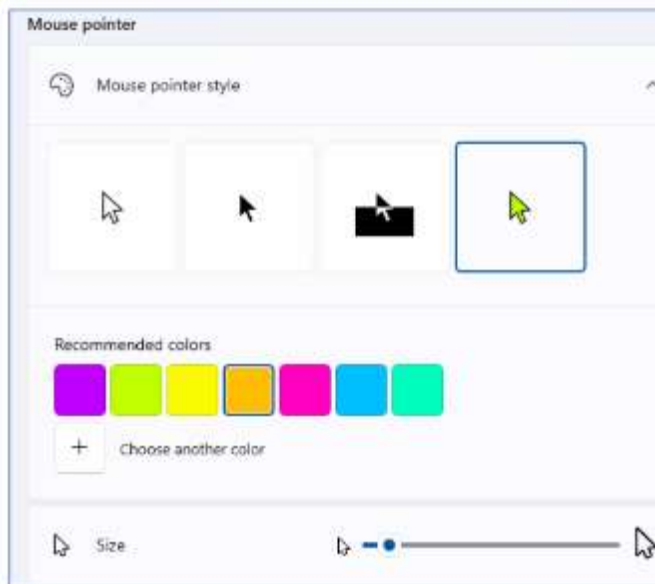
Text size setting

The "Visual Effects" setting allows you to control (via an On/Off slider) whether scrollbars are always shown or fade into view as you hover the mouse over a window. There are also sliders for Transparency and Animation effects and a dropdown for how long notifications are on the screen.

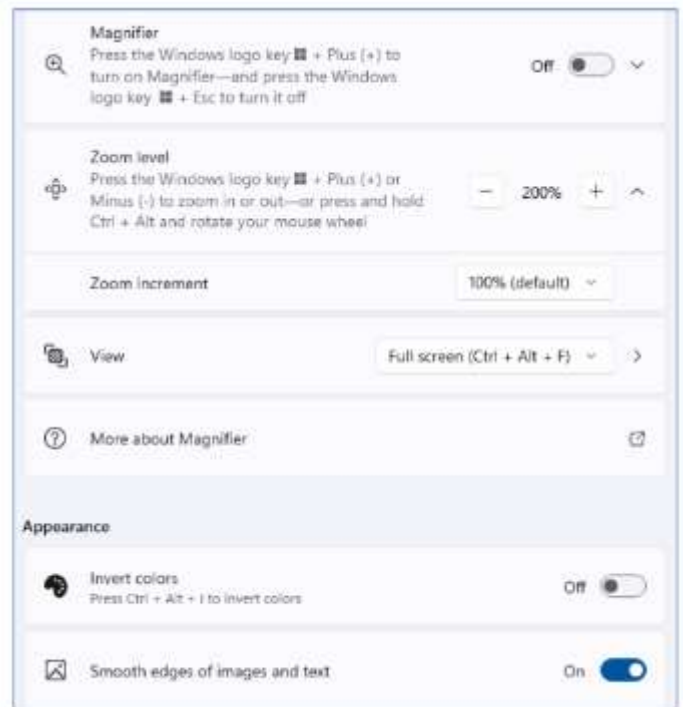


Visual effects setting

The "Mouse pointer" setting allows you to select the mouse pointer's style, color, and size. The size slider goes in steps of 1, representing a scale factor. For example, I've selected the outline pointer with a color of gold and a scale factor of two. This makes it easier to see and follow.

Magnifier setting

The last Vision setting we'll look at is the Magnifier. See the screenshot below. The Magnifier is turned on by pressing the Windows and + keys together. This will magnify (scale up) the screen by the Zoom level setting (default is 200%). You can turn off the Magnifier by pressing the Windows and Esc keys together.

You can press the Windows key and the + key together to increase the scale by the Zoom increment and press the Windows key and the – key together to decrease the scale by the Zoom increment. You can also press the Ctrl and Alt keys together and use the scroll wheel on your mouse to scale the Magnifier up or down.

You can pan around the magnified screen by moving your mouse pointer to the edges of the magnified screen. I'll leave it to my readers to explore the other Vision settings on their own.

Under the Accessibility > Hearing settings is one for Captions styles settings. These allow you to configure how closed captions appear on your screen. You can select from several default layouts or create a custom layout of your own. Settings > Accessibility > Captions. Click the button for Caption style and change it from default to another option, such as White on black, Small caps, Large text, or Yellow on blue.

Under Accessibility > Interaction (see the following screenshot) are various settings for Speech recognition and dictation, special keyboard behavior, using the keypad to move the mouse cursor, and using an eye tracker device to allow you to type using eye movements. For example, see the screenshot following.

Voice typing (dictation) is very easy to use. Place the mouse cursor into any text box on the screen (e.g., a Notepad or MS Word window) and press the Windows and H keys together. A small window will appear with a microphone icon in it. Click the icon to turn the microphone on or off. You can dictate when the microphone is on, and Windows will convert your spoken words to text in the on-screen textbox.



Interaction settings

The following is an example of dictation in a Notepad window. Once you have dictated into Notepad, WordPad, MS Word, or any other editor, you can edit, copy and paste the resulting text as if it had been typed in on the keyboard.
