Q&A - September meeting

Can't delete e-mail bin contents from phone.

Note book is tethered to Android phone for internet access.

Need to know exact arrangement details.

E-mail - IMAP/POP

Notebook - mail software Office 365 Outlook?

Phone - mail software Google Mail?

Are both programs open at the same time?

With any awkward problem it is essential for the situation and any related information to be clearly defined and written down.

This is necessary so that the person seeking help knows what is what and the helper has all the relevant data to hand.

Transfer data to new PC.

From an external drive copy and paste all the stored data files or restore from a backup file or file set.

Prints missing characters, words or lines.

Ran a print nozzle check, all OK.

Tried to print again, same result.

The Printer ink status display shows all OK.

Printers ink supply is in three types:-

Cartridge including print head

Cartridge, ink only

Tank filled from bottle

This printer uses ink only cartridges, six in total - five dye based for photos etc. - black, cyan, magenta, photo blue, yellow, and one pigment based for documents - black.

As the cartridges are compatible, not OEM, and are translucent it is possible to visually check the ink quantity.

Inspection of the large pigment one revealed that there was no ink in the half that contains no fibre wad.

It seems that sufficient ink could be drawn for a nozzle check only.
